SIDE BENDS


- Stand with your feet hip-distance apart, arms at your sides.
- As you reach down towards your toes with one arm, lift the other one up towards your waist, placing your hand on your hip.
- Alternate sides with one arm up, one arm down.
- Do 100 reps.



STANDING TWISTS

- Place your hands behind your head, elbows out wide and knees slightly bent. Isolate your core making sure your hips don't move.
- Twist to one side then the other alternating sides.
- Do 100 reps.



JACK KNIVES

- Lay on the floor or a bench with your legs straight out, arms stretched above your head, toes pointed towards the ceiling.
- Raise your arms towards your toes as you raise your legs to a 45- to 90-degree angle, keeping your shoulders off the floor (above). You should bring your arms way up over your belly button so your body looks just like a jack knife.
- Then return back to the floor or bench with your legs and arms stretched out.
- Do 40 reps.

Apple Cinnamon White Cake

Namaste again. I normally try to choose healthy recipes but this recipe seems to keep popping up in my Pinterest account so I figured I'd let you check it out. Enjoy!



Prep: 20 m Cook: 30 m Ready In: 50 m

Recipe By: Jinglebells

"A buttery white cake that comes together in minutes but tastes like you spent all day making it. Adding apples and cinnamon with brown sugar in layers makes this cake into an autumn delight. A scoop of ice cream is especially good with this cake."

INGREDIENTS

- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2/3 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 3/4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 apple, peeled and chopped

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and flour a 9x5-inch loaf pan.
- 2. Mix brown sugar and cinnamon together in a bowl.
- 3. Beat white sugar and butter together in a bowl using an electric mixer until smooth and creamy. Beat in eggs, 1 at a time, until incorporated; add vanilla extract.
- 4. Combine flour and baking powder together in a bowl; stir into creamed butter mixture. Mix milk into batter until smooth. Pour half the batter into the prepared loaf pan; add half the apples and half the brown sugar mixture. Lightly pat apple mixture into batter. Pour the remaining batter over apple layer; top with remaining apples and brown sugar mixture. Lightly pat apples into batter; swirl brown sugar mixture through apples using a finger or spoon.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center of the loaf comes out clean, 30 to 40 minutes.

Black History Month for many people turned out to be one that most would never forget. Shroud in dignity and pride, Donna Thompson-Bennett beautifully graced the stage with a rendition of the work of Ruby Sales while Tunisi Compound beat their drums to the rhythm of our ancestors. The rhythm began to stretch us, wooing us deeper into the experience. From the youth, to the young adults, to our seniors, they were there to answer the call. The children danced with a renewed sense of energy, telling a story with their bodies, each movement a turning of a page. It was clear they knew their purpose for being in that sacred space and

they poured out of their hearts to an audience of waiting vessels. Tiffany, the daughter of Rev. Anderson, led the cast and audience into Glory, a song performed by rapper Common and American recording artist John Legend. We were no longer watching a performance we were a part of an experience.

Culminating the evening, Tenesi, in the embodiment of our ancestor, confronted us on our own obligation to never forget the sacrifices made allowing each of us to be present. We were reminded of a society that desired our gifts and talents, however still reviled us as a people. We were reminded that the Atlantic Ocean is the home of many of our ancestors who sacrificed their bodies so that we might be present today. We were reminded that in spite of the greatest evil perpetrated in the history of mankind, we are the direct descendants of a people, whose resilience, will not die.

Mount Aery Baptist Church Security Corner

Namaste Brothers and Sisters! The major goal of the MABC Security Team is to provide a safe environment for you and your family here at The Mount. This starts with keeping you informed, but remember, security is everyone's responsibility. In this installment, we will cover Emergency Egress and Reporting Suspicious Activity.

Emergency Egress

You always want to be aware of the location of all exits anytime you enter a room. You want it to be second nature in the event of an emergency evacuation. When entering the Narthex or Sanctuary at The Mount, always check the placards placed on the walls to familiarize yourself with the information giving guidance on how to exit in case of an emergency egress. If you have any questions, please see an MABC Security Team member.

*Reporting Suspicious Activity

Prompt and detailed reporting of suspicious activities can help prevent violent crimes. If you see suspicious activity around the church campus, please report it to an MABC Security Team member, a Greeter, Usher, or Office Staff. In the event of a life threatening emergency, immediately call 9-1-1.

When reporting suspicious activity, it is helpful to give the most accurate description possible, including:

- Brief description of the activity
- Date, time and location of the activity
- · Physical identifiers of anyone you observed
- Descriptions of vehicles
- Information about where people involved in suspicious activities may have gone
- Your name and contact information (optional)

black history moment

Dr. Halle Tanner Dillion Johnson

Namaste again, this month we are honoring Dr. Halle Tanner Dillion Johnson, the first woman of any race to practice

> medicine in the state of Alabama.



Dr. Halle Tanner Dillion Johnson

September 1, 1894: Dr. Halle Tanner Dillion Johnson becomes the 1st woman of any race to practice medicine in the state of Alabama.

Halle Tanner was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, the oldest daughter of nine children to Benjamin Tucker and Sarah Elizabeth Tanner. Halle was well educated and as a young girl became familiar with the work of prominent African-American intellectuals.

CAREER:

Before beginning her new job, however, young Dr. Dillon had to face a significant obstacle: passing the Alabama State Medical Examination. The very fact that she was sitting for the examination caused a public stir in Montgomery, Alabama. She spent ten days taking the exam, addressing a different area of medicine each day. Her examiners included the directors and leading figures of most of the state's major medical institutions. Dillon impressed them with her responses and she passed the test.

Dr. Dillion was the 1st woman to practice medicine in the state of Alabama.

During her brief tenure at Tuskegee she was responsible for the health care of the school's 450 students and 30 faculty and staff. She also established a training school for nurses and founded the Lafavette Dispensary to serve the health care needs of local residents, often mixing medicines herself for their use. She also taught two classes each day.

AFTER TUSKEGEE:

Halle's tenure at Tuskegee ended in 1894 when she married the Reverend John Quincy Johnson, an African Methodist Episcopal minister and math instructor at Tuskegee. The couple moved first to Columbia, South Carolina, where Reverend Johnson became president of Allen University, a private school for black students. They later moved from Hartford, Connecticut to Atlanta, Georgia, and then to Princeton, New Jersey, as Reverend Johnson pursued undergraduate and graduate degrees in theology. Finally, in 1900 the couple settled in Nashville, Tennessee with their three children, and Reverend Johnson became the pastor of Saint Paul A.M.E. Church.

Halle died in Nashville from complications during childbirth on April 26, 1901.

MARRIAGE & COLLEGE:

In 1886 Halle married Charles Dillon, and the couple had a child before her husband's sudden death. A widow at 24, Halle returned to live with her family and decided to enter medical school. After three years of study at the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania, she earned her M.D. in 1891, graduating with honors.

Around the time of her graduation, African-American educator Booker T. Washington, founder of the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, had written to the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania to request a nomination for a teaching position he had been struggling to fill for four years. He hoped to find an African-American physician to serve the school and its surrounding community. Johnson accepted Washington's offer of US \$600 a month, including lodging and meals, and arrived to begin her service in August 1891.
